Isolation. It's such a dark and formidable word. For me it renders mental images of prison cells. Solidary confinement. Social distancing. The phrase indicates that we are to remove ourselves from society. I fear that far too many people have done that. It goes against human nature to distance yourself from society. In fact, until the recent outbreak of COVID-19 the phrase "social distancing" was used by sociologists to indicate a distancing from people not "like me" according to social grouping and status. It's a term of segregation. While I certainly understand that's not how we mean it now, let's be very careful that that's not what happens in reality. I want to talk about these two phrases and listen to God's Word on the matter.

Isolation. You don't have to be isolated. You don't live in Isolation. First and foremost, you have fellowship with God the Father, through Jesus the Son, and by the Holy Spirit. Jesus promised the disciples that the Spirit of Truth was with you and "shall be in you." We live in the age when the Spirit of God doesn't just fall on us, but He is in us. You never have to be alone. You never have to be isolated. In John 14:20 Jesus said, "I am in my Father, and you are in me, and I am in you." You don't live in Isolation, you live in fellowship.

You also don't have to be isolated from other believers. You may be six feet apart, behind closed doors, or miles away from friends and family. You may not be able to feel the warmth of an embrace from another human, but we are truly blessed to live in a day when we have so many ways to connect. A phone call doesn't replace a handshake, but it comes very close for now. Reach out. Connect with other people. Don't turn inward, turn outward to fellow man. Use this as a time to connect with people you've been meaning to reach for Christ. Someone you know is feeling just as lonely as you are and doesn't have the fellowship you have with Christ. Let them know they don't have to be alone. Connect with fellow believers and encourage each other in the goodness of God. We have so much to be thankful for. Call someone today and let them know you are thankful for them.

Social Distancing. This is a great tool we have to fight this virus (or any virus). I think it may be the best tool moving forward and that we will be using this strategy long after we are back in clothing stores, schools and "normal" church services. We are going to see a drop in other viruses as a result. As we fight COVID-19 with social distancing, we are also fighting noroviruses, influenzas and rhinoviruses. We could be a much healthier planet moving forward. But don't allow physical distancing to become social distancing. When we get "back to normal" don't let it be an excuse to only spend time with people who are socially like you. Don't circle the wagons around "me, my four, and no more." Find an opportunity to reach out to people less fortunate than you. Give to the poor, and don't just give to a professional who gives to the poor. This allows you to keep your distance emotionally. Really invest in the lives of people less fortunate than you. Once we are free to go into public, find a way to minister. I often take my guitar to downtown Beckley when the weather is nice and sit on the park benches ministering to the homeless or the passerby. Once the stay at home order is lifted, I'll do that again. Will I change some things? Yes. I may not lay hands on people as I pray for them. I may not sit on a bench with my arm on their shoulder. I may wear a mask when I go to pray for them, but I will not retreat into a world of people who are just like me and lose the chance to reach someone different with the gospel.

All of the things I'm talking about are spiritual. I'm not telling you to break any restrictions or recommendations about what to do in the physical. But don't let that change who you are in the spiritual. Get creative. Give a cup of cold water in His name. You may not have much to give physically. Give of your time. Give of your heart. Give the gospel. Peoples physical needs may increase, but people always have had and always will have spiritual needs. With Christ living in you, you can meet those needs as Christ's Ambassador. Matthew 25:36-40 "I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me." "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? "The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."
